

Why Middle Years Learning?

"Primary-secondary transition has been depicted as an abrupt disjuncture between two distinctive forms of schooling."

"During the early years of secondary school, students make the least progress, the gap between low and high performing students increases and students are less engaged with education."



Why Middle Years Learning?

"Disengagement from learning and school by some students in the early secondary years is a well recognised phenomenon. Often, 'switching off' is accompanied by behavioural problems which can further undermine educational attainment and later educational participation and achievement."



So, SFCC Middle Years Learning focuses on:

- a continuum of learning that promotes seamless transitions and flexible groupings of students as communities of learners.
- Gradual release program academically and pastorally
- Significant intervention and extension
- Teams of teachers working collaboratively towards common goals

Unit Title: What it means to be Catholic In this unit students explore what it means to be 'Catholic'. They identify key beliefs, values and practices of the Catholic Tradition and explore how these influence the lives of Catholic communities. Students examine the organisational structure of the Catholic Church and identify significant people and events within it. They will be encouraged to draw on their experience of belonging in a Catholic community and to consider the contribution they can make to the life of the Church.

Unit Title: Celebratina Diversity

New Year 7 students are supported to get to know each other through their exploration and composition of texts about cultural and individual diversity. Students respond to a range of textual forms, with a focus on poetry, and then use these model texts as springhoards into composing their own texts. The writing process is at the core of assessment, and collaboration in the forms of small group conferencing and peer editing is supported and fostered.

MATHEMATICS

Unit Title: Computation with Integers In this unit students develop an understanding of positive and negative numbers and how they can be represented on the number line. The four operations are covered as well as computations using order of operations. Students will be introduced to negative numbers using a variety of practical and every day activities. The skills developed in this unit are fundamental and should be continually practiced throughout the course.

This unit allows students the opportunity to work with the concept of time. Students need to be able to perform calculations with and convert time with a strong emphasis on applying this to their everyday lives.

С	The student has a sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved an adequate level of competence in the processes and skills.
D	The student has a basic knowledge and understanding of the content and has achieved a limited level of competence in the processes and skills.
E	The student has an elementary knowledge and understanding in few areas of the content and has achieved very limited competence in some of the processes and skills.



EXPECTATIONS FOR STUDENTS

Students must:

- 1.1 enter all homework tasks and due dates in their College diary.
- 1.2 complete and submit all assigned homework tasks on the due date and to the best of their ability.
- 1.7 spend (on average) approximately 45 90 minutes per week night on home study.

What does my child need each day?

How does the diary work?

- College diary is used every lesson
- USed for organisation and communication
- Teachers issue merit stamps (green) for outstanding homework/classwork/behaviour
- ☐ Teachers issue notification stamps (red) for concerns relating to homework/no equipment/behaviour
- ☐ Teachers issue house point stamps for Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L)



How does the diary work?

- □ Parents/Carers must sign the diary at the end of every week. This will be checked by the Pastoral Class teacher on the following Monday.
- Parents/Carers should have already signed pages 2 and 3 - Use of Diary and Student Responsibility Agreement
- Students will write homework/assessments and important events in their diary.



Can my child bring their mobile phone to school?



Mobile Phones

- Once students enter the gate phones must be switched off.
- ☐ First preference phone to be taken to the office.
- Any student with a phone on during class time (even on silent) will be confiscated and given to office.
 - 1st time back at end of day
 - 2nd time parents collect or back end of week
 - □ 3rd time afternoon detention for defiance
- Parents can contact College Reception should they need to contact a student
- In extraordinary circumstances, students can ask to call home from College Reception.
- 2:45pm Students are able to turn their phone on as they move towards their dismissal area.



How can my child use the canteen?

- ☐ Middle Years Learning students can submit a lunch order before the start of the school day. They can collect their food at the start of Break 1.
- Alternatively, Middle Years Learning students can line up during both Break 1 and Break 2.
- ☐ Change is limited, so students should avoid \$20, \$50 and \$100 notes.



How can my child use the library?

- Years 7 and 8 do not have a set time and can access the Library during break times, before and after school.
- On a Tuesday 3:10-4:10pm, we are looking to run Homework Club for students in Years 5-8.
- On a Wednesday 2:50-3:50pm, we are looking to run "Independent Study" for students in Years 7 and 8.



When does my child participate in sport?
